Before you watch the video, what phrases do you think the Brazilian fans will say?



Vocabulary

Phrase

A group of words that go together and have a particular meaning

Beach

A place by the sea with sand or pebbles where people go to relax

Ice tea

A cold drink made with by cooling tea with ice, often served with sugar and lemon

Coconut

A very large nut with a white part that you eat, and liquid in the centre. The liquid is often served as a drink, straight from the nut.

Bathroom

A room with a bath, a sink and usually a toilet. In many places, it is considered impolite to ask where a toilet is so people ask for the bathroom.
